

Online Innovation in Canyon Country

Located in picturesque southern Utah, Kane County spans 4,109 square miles and is home to about 7,700 people, making it one of the least populated areas in the United States.

These scenic swaths of red-rock mountains and valleys create unique challenges in delivering a high-quality education to K-12 students. Staffing and curriculum issues loom large.

Kane County school leaders must innovate continually to keep students progressing on pace with their urban peers. Educators deal with course delivery challenges daily. Recently installed school bus Wi-Fi turns long rides into long homework sessions. Courses held in larger schools are live-streamed out to smaller rural schools.


According to Superintendent Ben Dalton, innovations like these would be insufficient without key opportunities that BYU Independent Study has brought to the district's students. The district licenses BYUIS High School Suite content for its Kane Digital High School (DHS) online courses, and teachers can adapt and implement course content in a variety of ways.

One of the most notable innovative achievements in Kane County education resides at Lake Powell School. Located among red rocks with a view of sapphire-blue waters, this school is housed inside a national park building. With a two-hour drive to the nearest school and a staggering five-hour drive to district offices, the school has no choice but to use technology to keep its fourteen K–12 students progressing toward grade-level standards and graduation.

"It's such a small number of students that without BYU Independent Study, we would have to pay a full-time teacher in each content area, which was not practical for that number of students," says Superintendent Dalton. "It made it very difficult to find curricula for those students to get them into an education setting." Now thanks to digital course delivery, this school is run by a single teacher-principal who leverages online courses all day long.


While some courses can be livestreamed in digitally from two other district schools, all students in grades 9–12 use BYUIS High School Suite curricula to earn credit toward graduation. "These students excel and do well on end-of-level assessments," says Dalton. "It's been a really successful environment there to have certified [online] teachers. A lot of the elective courses come from BYU Independent Study."

Students appreciate the flexibility to pursue interest areas. Recently a student with a full course schedule needed to obtain credit for Spanish II in an online format. He approached a teacher who had the necessary endorsements to become a BYUIS teacher of record, and that teacher agreed to oversee his assessments. School leaders were more

than happy to pay the teacher \$50 per student for this extra help outside of normal course assignments. This new arrangement has led to several students being able to complete second-year Spanish.

Flexible study and assignment work also benefit students enrolled in college-level concurrent enrollment courses that meet every other day. Students use their off days to work on BYUIS courses and receive credit

In an elementary school, a deaf student became the unexpected recipient of

American Sign Language (ASL) help from a high school junior who had taken ASL courses through BYUIS. Although an online interpreter was available to tell the student what was said in the classroom, many others around her needed help "talking" to her. The high school ASL student, Lexie, went in person to teach basic signing to the deaf student's class, which helped everyone communicate better. Both the deaf student and her mother soon took BYUIS online courses

in ASL as well, greatly improving both their vocabularies and their quality of life. In this rural setting, there

would be no other way for a deaf student to obtain this type of education.

Teachers also use online courses to help those facing serious challenges. One middle school student was recently taken from her home and placed in foster care elsewhere. This situation could have derailed her progress, but it did not, thanks to online middle school course content. A month later she returned to in-person classes, perfectly in sync with the rest of the class.

Educators also help other students use online course content to keep up while they are on a long-term school suspension. A teacher or aide can monitor progress online, or sometimes an aide will meet a suspended student at a public library to provide support if needed.

District-wide, Kane County schools use BYU Independent Study courses for four main purposes.

First, BYUIS courses provide an online teacher and an online curriculum. The

district pays a fee for the enrolled student's course, which includes a certified instructor. This helps the school because the student is enrolled at the local school level, where educators can keep track of their grades.

Kane County Schools also use BYUIS for all credit recovery courses. This approach has been very cost-effective compared to programs previously employed by the district.

Most of the district's teachers have fully embraced the digital learning environment.

A third approach involves using BYUIS online content for blended classrooms. Teachers can upload their own materials to the learning management system, including content and assessments. This allows them to have turnkey, instant online curricula that students can access on those long bus rides across desert terrain. Most of the district's teachers have fully embraced the digital learning environment and see in it distinct advantages over teaching on paper or by other means.

Finally, BYUIS online courses provide a pathway forward for advanced students, in addition to their traditional schedule. These accelerated honors and AP courses can provide challenging curricula not available at the local schools.

"BYU Independent Study has been very beneficial to students in our district," says Dalton.

Another Chance for Your Diploma

Do you know an adult who wishes they had graduated from high school?

Tough breaks prevent many from graduating from high school. Life happens.

People delay for all sorts of good reasons, like needing to work full time or support a loved one. Being away from school for a long period of time can make it harder to go back and try again.

"When I was younger I did not have the opportunity to complete high school, and it always made me so sad," says Betty Hill, an effervescent grandmother from Miami, Florida. She didn't like having less education than she desired, but the odds were against her ever getting that diploma.

In her late 70s, Betty finally realized that she had to do something about her situation. She learned about the adult diploma program offered through BYUIS and started working toward her goal to graduate from high school. "I really enjoyed having the classes online because I did it in the comfort of my home."

There were days when she wanted to give up. But through consistent support and encouragement from family and BYU staff, she persevered and walked across the high school graduation stage in her 80s. "All of us attended her graduation ceremony. We are just really very proud of her," says Betty's daughter, Jessica.

"It was not difficult for me to get to my computer and start working. I was proud—proud of myself that I was able to do this," Betty says. Her graduation confirmed what she had hoped about herself—that she was not a quitter but a finisher. This achievement motivated her to take college-level courses as well.

"You don't have to be any certain age to take a course at BYU Independent Study," she notes. "Anyone can take a course. All you've got to have is the desire, the interest, and the love for what you are doing—and pursue it."



The Flexibility You and Your Students Need

For Lori Hartmann, the flexibility and adaptability of the High School Suite program is making a significant difference for her school and students.

Hartmann is co-principal of Downtown College Prep in El Primero, California, and has seen firsthand how BYU's High School Suite (HSS) product can enable students' success.

Especially for a smaller school, HSS provides options that would otherwise be unavailable.

"We use [High School Suite] in a variety of ways," she says. "We have students using it for credit recovery to get back on track for graduation. We also have students using the online courses to take classes that they wouldn't be able to take otherwise because of scheduling

conflicts. We're a small school, with many courses only having one section, so that can create challenges for students."

Hartmann's students are also using a blend of online and traditional classroom learning in order to succeed.

"For other students, the traditional classroom environment is a challenge, and so they are taking a blend of online courses and traditional classroom

"One student in particular had decided to drop out of school because his anxiety was so severe that he was no longer able to attend," Hartmann explains. "I was able to get him back on track with online courses only and he is slated to graduate this year. On top of online courses, he has also been taking a few community college courses and plans to continue his education there."

Whether it's helping students get back on track for graduation, allowing them

For one student on the verge of dropping out, the flexibility that HSS provided was just what was needed.

A Mission to Improve Vision

Future Optometry Student Determined to Help Others

Elizabeth Yaros had struggled her whole life with limited vision.

Then, with the help of vision therapy, a world of new opportunities opened up to her. She gained the ability to see in 3-D, read without using text-to-speech software, and drive a car.

Having experienced this vision breakthrough, Elizabeth wanted to help others improve their vision too. Her first step would be optometry school.

Before she could apply to optometry school, though, she needed to update her coursework. It had been more than 10 years since her last undergraduate class, and her records were too old to use in her application. She would need to retake some courses to fulfill the prerequisites for optometry school.

Going to school full time wasn't a possibility. Elizabeth needed an online option so she could complete her coursework and still work full time. She learned about the opportunities available through BYU Independent Study while talking with a professor. As she explored the IS catalog, she found the classes she needed.

"I loved how universal design was used in the Independent Study courses."

"I was looking for courses that were from a reputable institution, cost-effective, and self-paced since I work full-time," Elizabeth said. "From the syllabi and course design, I could tell what I would learn in the courses would give me a solid foundation for optometry school."

BYU IS checked all the boxes. It was the right option for her to complete the prereqs for optometry school. Along with the other benefits IS offered, she loved the accessibility of the courses.

"I loved how universal design was used in the Independent Study courses," Elizabeth said. "If I was experiencing eye fatigue, I could still use a screen reader to read the course material to me. It allowed me to complete my coursework on my schedule, no matter the time of day. Also, because the course information is outlined in the online portal, all my courses felt very straightforward."

Elizabeth's determination to help others is pushing her forward to accomplish something extraordinary. Seeing Elizabeth overcome vision impairment and challenges to become an optometrist makes us proud to be part of the education community.

Innovations

Accessibility Project: High School Math

Just a few years ago, delivering accessible mathematical content that was both correct and consistent was either impossible or undocumented. In fact, when the IS high school math instructional design team investigated how to make math courses accessible, they found that because technology had not advanced far enough yet, very few people (if any) were delivering truly accessible math content. This was despite the fact that educators and accessibility experts were working on the problem.

Since that time, our high school math team, eager to accomplish true accessibility, had been monitoring technology in search of a standard way to deliver math content. A standoff existed between viable and consistent alt text, displayed math equations and content, and printability.

Fortunately, advancements in technology now allow us to deliver completely accessible math courses online. Our math team recently completed a huge conversion project that moved content to nearly 600 accessible HTML pages used throughout our secondary math series.

It means a lot to us to have the ability deliver our high school math courses to all students who need them, so that all students can benefit from our award-winning math model. We will continue making improvements to the math courses, especially when it comes to increased interactivity and multiple learning paths. The future of math instruction online is looking bright. We are committed to making your students' educational experiences great.



Saving the Day: TA/Tutor Services

Our robust in-house team of teaching assistants and tutors includes over 100 part-time employees and three full-time leaders who work tirelessly to provide instruction, grading, online reception, and tutoring to students.

In 2018 this group conducted 138,184 documented student interactions, an average of over 2,500 per week. Of those, 110,864 provided one-on-one help with World Languages courses.

Of the eligible TA/Tutor Services employees, 76% earned International TUTOR Training Program Certification (ITTPC) from the College Reading & Learning Association (CRLA) in 2018.



Dynamic University Math Exams

To enhance test security, University IS courses now employ dynamic test banks. Each and every student receives a unique set of test questions, thanks to the millions of possible exam iterations. Practice exams also use dynamic test banks, giving students ample opportunity to practice and make sure they will be successful on exams. Students can take practice exams as many times as they want and will see different questions every time. This automatic variability also includes built-in safeguards to ensure parallel, equivalent levels of difficulty between tests. Math exams are no longer printed, but must be taken online at an approved testing center after showing valid government identification. All this adds up to provide secure, reliable tests of student knowledge.



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






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
