





2020 CHANGES TO EDUCATOR LICENSING

The Utah State Board of Education makes significant changes to Educator Licensing

On July 1, 2020 all current Utah Educator Licenses will convert to an Associate or Professional Educator License. Board Rule R277-301 has been revised over the past year to make significant changes on how educators are licensed in Utah. If you hold a current Alternative Routes to Licensure (ARL) or Academic Pathway to Teaching (APT) license and are hired at a local education agency (LEA) your license will automatically convert to an Associate Educator License on July 1, 2020 and you will continue working on your Professional Growth Plan (PGP) on the converted Associate Educator License. If you hold a current standard Level 1, 2, or 3 Utah Educator License it will convert automatically to a Professional Educator License. Anyone with an Associate Educator License will need to work with a state-approved university or alternate educator preparation program (APPEL) in order to move to a Professional Educator License. The LEA Specific, Associate, and Professional licenses will be the only educator licenses available after July 1, 2020. Licenses such as Letter of Authorization, APT without Current Employment, and

There will be 14 possible licensing areas of concentration including: Early Childhood Education, Elementary Education, Secondary Education, and Special Education. SMARTER TEACHING:




Zoom is a great tool for distance learning or online-based instruction. With Zoom you can meet virtually with your students via a video call.

You can teach lessons, share a read aloud or just check in with them. You can even record your meetings so that students who didn't come can watch it later.

You don't need any fancy tools or a degree in computer science and Zoom is currently free. It usually has limits on the length of the meeting and the number of attendees. But, Zoom is offering a free account for teachers during these times that does not have these limitations. Simply go to https://zoom.us/docs/ent/schoolverification.html to get started. If you need any help, just contact SEDC and we will be happy to get you started.

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The Assoicate License is for anyone who wants to become a Utah teacher and needs to use an alternate pathway to earn a Professional Educator License. You must have a Bachelor's degree from a regionally accredited university or have appropriate CTE expertise/certification. It is important to note that an Associate License is a temporary, non-transferable license. In order to move from an Associate Educator License to a Professional Educator License, you will need to be

hired at a Utah LEA and work with that LEA to complete all requirements for the Professional Educator License. LEAs in the SEDC Region will be working with SEDC's APPEL program in order for their teachers with Associate Licenses to complete the requirements for a Professional License. The APPEL program will include taking online classes through Southern Utah University, preparing for and passing a Pedagogical Performance Assessment (the PPAT) and participating in the mentoring and coaching processes of the LEA. Teachers with Associate Licenses will be observed and evaluated by their building level administration. It is anticipated that the APPEL program will take 2 to 3 years to complete.
